  - Incorrect answer = measurement error

  - Same answers on multiple survey occasions/variations in wording

  - Long list (self-administered)
  - Short list (interviewer administered)
  - Short list w/ branching (interviewer administered)

- Don't ask agree/disagree questions that fall in the middle of a continuum

- ► Some bad questions:
  - Do you believe that Obamacare should be repealed, or do you think the problems with the website will be fixed?
